



Money Numbers 1: How to read money numbers

Let's learn how to read money numbers.
Do you know what these numbers mean?

Coffee.....	\$1.75
Tea	\$1.50

In Canada, we use **dollars** and **cents** for our money.
100 cents is the same as 1 dollar.

 This is the sign for **dollars**.

You can write **3 dollars** like this:

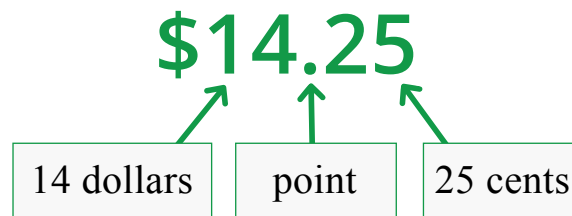
\$3 or \$3.00

 This is the sign for **cents**.

You can write **10 cents** like this:

10¢ or \$0.10

You can put dollars and cents together, like this: **\$14.25**.
The numbers **before** the point are dollars. The numbers **after** the point are cents.



\$14.25 means 14 dollars and 25 cents.
